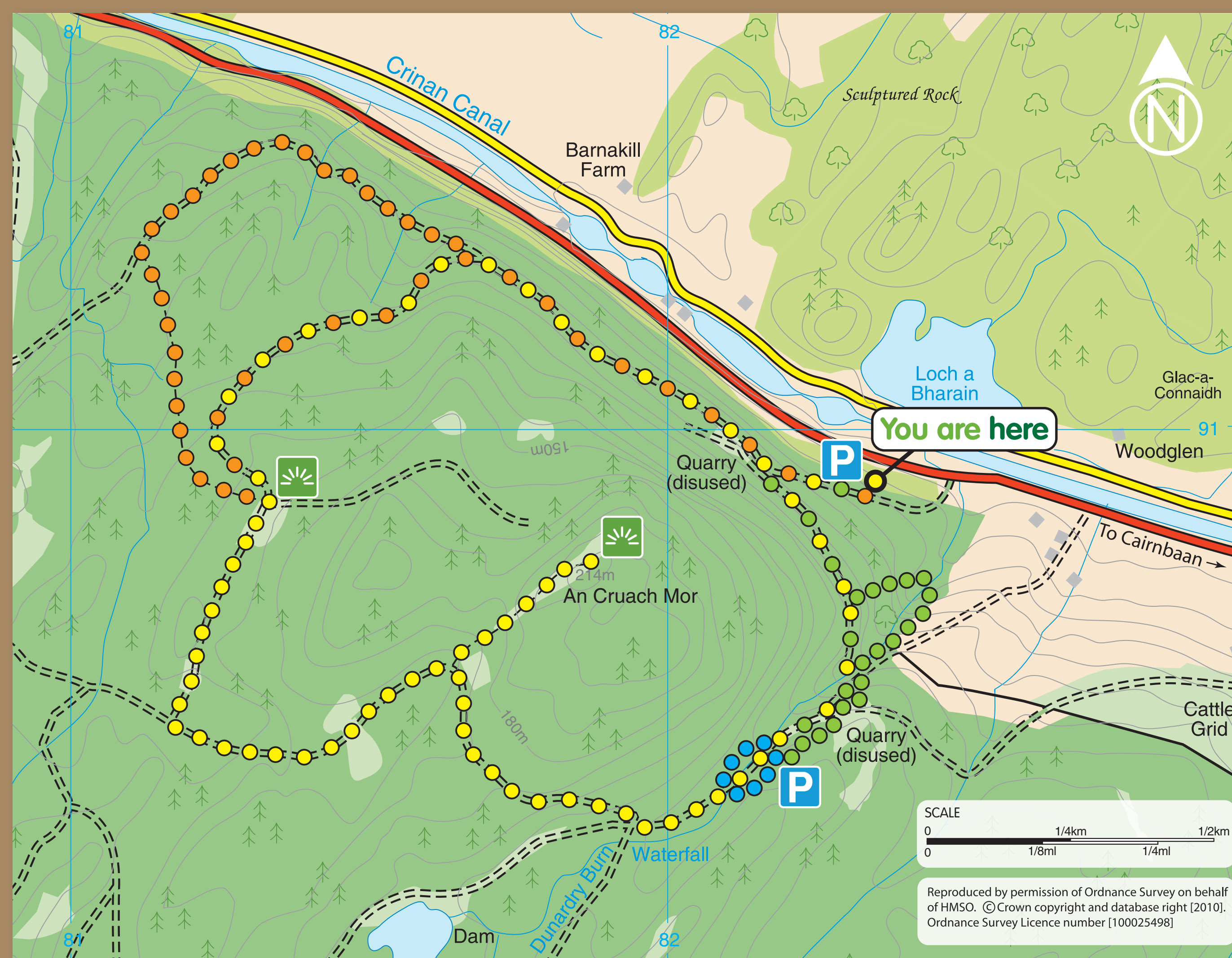




Fàilte gu Dun an Àird Rìgh Welcome to **Dunardry**, the fort of the high king



Trail information

Dunardry Trail

3 miles / 4.8 km
Approx. time: 2 hour

Grade: Moderate

Follow the yellow waymarkers up the forest road for a fairly strenuous walk to An Cruach Mòr, the great stack, which gives wonderful views of Mòine Mhòr, the great peatbog; of Dùn Ad, the fort by the River Add, and of the Sound of Jura.

Bardarroch Trail

2 1/3 miles / 3.7 km
Approx. time: 1 hour 15 mins

Grade: Moderate

Follow the orange waymarkers and experience the peaceful tranquillity of the forest as you walk beneath the tall conifers.

Near to Nature

1 1/2 mile / 2.4 km
Approx. time: 45 mins

Grade: Strenuous

An exciting and steep walk beside the Dunardry Burn.

This trail includes some steep flights of steps.

Green Gate Loop

285 yards / 0.26 km

Grade: Easy

Get close to nature on this easier access trail.

Drive towards Cairnbaan and take the road through the houses.

Imagine ...

- [500 BC] ... building a safe place on the hilltop
- [500 AD] ... wielding an axe to fell timber
- [1700 AD] ... stripping bark from oak trees to tan leather
- [1800 AD] ... sleeping as your burning stack of oak turns to charcoal
- [2000 AD] ... driving a giant harvester and felling a forest

Beachd-smuainich air ...

- [500 RC] ... àite tèarainte a thogail air mullach na beinne
- [500 AD] ... tuagh a chleachdadh gus craobhan a leagail
- [1700 AD] ... an rùsg a stialladh bho chraobhan daraich gus leathar a chartadh
- [1800 AD] ... a bhith nad chadal fhad 's a bhiodh do chruach-daraich a' losgadh gu gual-fhiodh
- [2000 AD] ... a bhith a' dràibheadh inneal-buain brùideil gus coille a leagail

Knapdale Forest

The forest is a precious relic of the Atlantic oakwoods which began spreading when the Ice Age ended. It's home to red squirrels, pine martens, deer, crossbills and sparrow hawks.



The name 'Knapdale' comes from the Gaelic words 'Cnap' (little hill) and 'Dail' (field). The area was known as Cnapadal a' bhuntàta mhòir – Knapdale of the great potatoes.

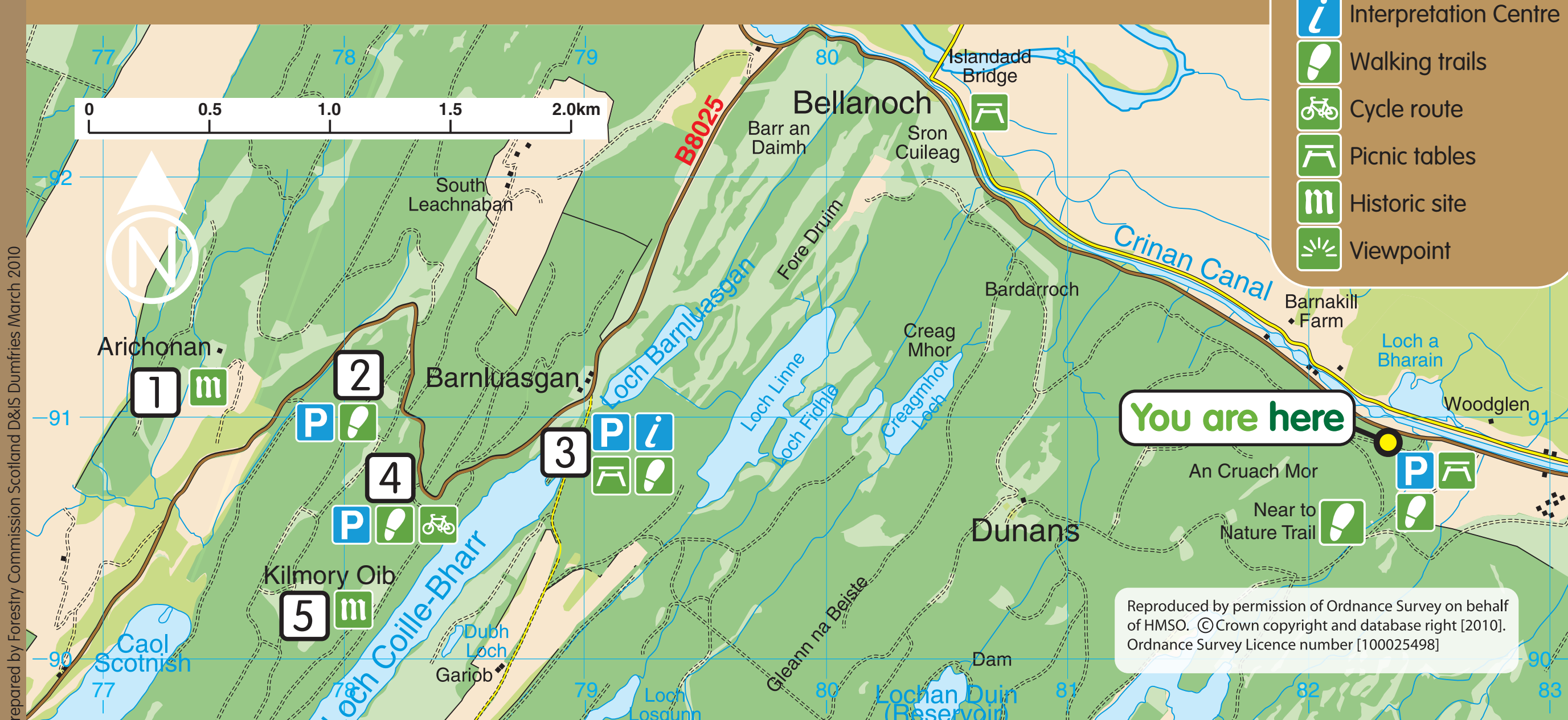
