West Midlands: Forest School Challenge Fund

Background Forest School originated in Scandinavia in the 1950s. The aim was to encourage children to learn social, physical and educational skills while encouraging an appreciation and understanding of the environment. By the 1980s it had become an integral part of the Danish early years programme. Forest School was introduced to Great Britain by Bridgwater College in the 1990s and has rapidly grown in popularity especially with early years and primary schools.

What is Forest School? Forest School is an inspirational process that offers children, young people and adults, regular opportunities to achieve, and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands on learning experiences in a local woodland environment.

Forest School provides an excellent opportunity to bring learning to life, allowing children, young people and adults to explore and learn in a constructive way. This inspirational process increases self-confidence, self-esteem, improves individuals' ability to work co-operatively and counters a lack of motivation and negative attitude towards learning, while offering the opportunities to take risks, make choices and initiate learning for themselves.

What happens at a Forest School?

- The first step is to train to become a qualified Level 3 Forest School leader - see training section for further details.
- Establish the needs of your learner group.
- Find an appropriate local woodland site or area in your own grounds, and gain the appropriate permission to use the site.
- A risk assessment is carried out by a qualified leader, to ensure the site is safe for the children and adults to visit.
- A typical programme involves the Forest School leader initially talking to the parents/carers and explaining all about Forest School and the sort of activities the participants will be doing. Parents of specific groups are invited to visit the Forest School site.
- The Forest School leaders get to know the participants and gain their confidence before taking them to the woodland, for example by leading activities at the children's educational setting for one or two sessions.
- The group (typically up to 15) visit the same local woodland site on a regular basis (once a week or fortnightly) ideally throughout the year, except in extreme conditions.
- Each session is learner-centred, based on the skills and needs of that group.
- Games are played and small achievable tasks are set, such as hide and seek, building shelters, learning how to use appropriate tools, lighting fires, cooking.
- The participants may learn basic woodland skills as a method to try and boost their self-confidence and raise their self-esteem.
- The participants learn to use natural materials and develop practical and intellectual skills, which can all be linked with the National Curriculum or the Curriculum for Excellence in Scotland.

The Forest School model is suited to people of all ages and has been found to be particularly successful with children and young people who may struggle to achieve in the more formal classroom setting.

Participants are invited to woodland sites where they are supported in their learning, encouraged to explore the outdoor environment and appreciate nature. They use tools and learn boundaries of behaviour both physical and social. It has been found that the combination of freedom and responsibility is particularly beneficial to those with little confidence or challenging behaviour. Forest School allows participants to grow and discover their abilities without fear of criticism or failure.

Forest School provide a valuable teaching tool for a wide range of curriculum subjects, and is an excellent way to support and enrich the National Curriculum. Forest School can help develop and integrate a range of subjects from Biology and Sciences, Maths, Citizenship, Design and Technology, P.E, Art and English. A non-classroom environment gives children increased stimulation and encourages a greater learning potential.

The Forestry Commission Woodland Improvement Grant (WIG) Challenge Fund supports this initiative. The WIG offers schools, youth and environmental charities and other organisations the opportunity to apply for a grant, which will support setting up a Forest School site. The WIG will also offer support for the training of practitioners to investigate and lead their own Forest School.

The WIG Fund The Forestry Commission West Midlands Region has secured £180,000 to support the concept of Forest Schools in the West Midlands for three years. This WIG fund must be disbursed within financial years 2008-09, 2009-10 and 2010-11.

This funding will enable a series of Level 3 trained Forest Schools to be set up within the Region through single discretionary capital payments. Grants from this fund will be made to successful applicants on completion of the agreed work. The grant will be determined as a proportion of the costs of the agreed project.

New grants for the final year

We can now offer a **Capped Challenge grant** worth up to a maximum of £2,000 for each setting OR an **Open Challenge grant** worth up to a maximum of £10,000 for each setting.

Work items eligible for Capped Grant

**** These items are considered 'compulsory' for a new Forest School site. The Forestry Commission can only offer grant aid to settings where Forest School is to be delivered by a qualified Forest School L3 Leader.**

Work items eligible for Open Challenge Grant

Funding will be used to support the infrastructure for Forest Schools. The priority in Year 3 of this Challenge Fund will be given to the set-up cost involved with Forest Schools using Codes F1 to F6. Codes F7 to F11 are considered secondary items to which funding would be considered, but given a lower priority if funding applications exceed our budget restraints.

Your application may only choose from any of the work items below.

Where does the WIG apply?

The fund is available in the West Midlands Government Office region, which encompasses the West Midlands metropolitan area, the counties of Warwickshire, Staffordshire, Shropshire and Worcestershire, plus Herefordshire and other unitary authorities. Projects selected for funding will be spread throughout the region, nominally at least one per county.

What proportion of costs can be paid?

The aim is to offer support in a range of locations and situations, therefore it will be necessary to maintain flexibility in the proportion that the Forestry Commission contributes.

Applications will be judged against a set of public benefit criteria (see Annex 2). Once the application has been assessed we will write to you informing you of the level of grant you will receive. If you are successful in securing a grant we will invite you to confirm how you wish to proceed.

Is there a time limit?

The final year of the Forest School WIG will have a claim year of 1st April 2010 to 31st March 2011.

Applications for the third year must be received by 31 October 2009, and work must be undertaken and claim submitted by 16th February 2011.

Failure to complete the agreed work or make the claim before the deadline will mean that no right to the grant will exist. Any payments that may be made in these cases will be at the Forestry Commission's absolute discretion.

How do I apply? Applications must be made on form EWGS 1 and EWGS Forest School and submitted with an OS Master Map® showing the areas for which grant is sought. The EWGS General Guide explains about the maps and how to obtain them free of charge. In making an application, you should seek to answer all the items listed in Annex 2.

When can I claim? The grant should be claimed as a lump sum when you have completed all of the work agreed in the Contract. You must do all the work agreed and maintain the facilities to our reasonable satisfaction.

In this, the final year of the scheme, the work must be undertaken and your claim submitted by 16th February 2011.

Training to become a Forest School Leader

To be a Forest School Leader it is important to undertake the Level 3 qualification. However, there are also Level 1, 2 and 4 courses available:

- **Level 3** training is available to teachers, support assistants, youth workers nursery nurses, etc, with relevant appropriate experience.
- **Level 2** training is shorter, and designed for people with less previous experience of working with children and young people, or those who only want to work as Forest School assistants.
- **Level 1** training is available to people who want an introduction to Forest School.

Before you can lead Forest School, you need a first aid qualification. The First Aid qualification can be either First Aid at Work (4 days) or the Intermediate Temporary Care (ITC) Qualification First Aid in the Outdoors (2 days) and is valid for 3 years. Due to the outdoor nature of the work it is recommended that the ITC qualification is gained in addition to the First Aid at Work especially if Forest School sessions are to be led in remote locations.

Level 3 Training Providers

Most trainers offering Open College Network qualifications in Forest School now belong to the OCN Forest School Training Network. The Network was started in 2006 and recommends the following requirements for lead trainers delivering Level 3 courses:

Recognised Level 3 Forest School Qualification

Experience of setting up and running a range of Forest School programmes since qualification.

Recognised qualification in teaching and assessing Level 3/adults

Proven experience of L3 Forest School training or mentoring by an existing member of the OCN Training Network or L4 Training the Trainers Award (currently being developed)

Active membership of the OCN Training Network including attendance at annual moderation/standardisation meeting and willingness to share good practice.

The Open College Network (OCN) runs four levels of qualifications. To become a Forest School Leader you will need to have completed OCN unit Level 3 (Forest School Practitioners' Award).

OCN Level 1 – Forest School Skills Award

30/60 learning hours: An introduction to Forest Schools

Entry requirements: An interest in working with people in the outdoor environment

Course content: This is a three day course for parents, young people (14-19yrs) adult volunteers, nursery nurses, teachers etc who have an interest in working with young people in the outdoors.

OCN Level 2- Assistant Forest School Practitioner Award

60 learning hours: Qualification that will enable you to assist a Forest School leader. Two courses are available; one general and one child-care based

Entry requirements: Either Level 1 or previous experience working with chosen client group.

Course content: This award is for students who wish to assist the Forest School Practitioner. This qualification forms two-thirds of the Practitioners qualification and can be used as prior learning if required

OCN Level 3- Forest School Practitioners Award

90 learning hours: Qualification to become a Forest School Leader.

Entry requirements: Any level 2 relevant qualification i.e., Forest School, PGCE, CACHE, Play Work, Youth Work, Probation Care, Woodland/ Countryside Management and 2 years experience working with client group with a portfolio including references and evidence

What you will be trained to do: This award will enable you to run an alternative complementary curriculum outside. If you have relevant Level 2 qualifications, and are over 21 years old, you can work with your chosen client group and run your Forest School independently

Course Content: Before the course, trainees should attend a 2 day 'First Aid in the Outdoors' qualification (ITC) Immediate Temporary Care. The Level 3 course is approximately 50% practical and 50% theory. The theory content is split into 3 units:
Forest School Practical Skills and Woodland Management
Learning and Development at Forest School
Establishment and Delivery of a Forest School Programme
These units will include elements on Health & Safety, self-esteem, emotional learning, behavior and identifying natural learning preferences of young people aged between 3 and 18 years.

Approximately three months after the course, participants will attend a 3-day course. This will include tutorial time, and further practical training and assessments.

After a further 3 months participants will be assessed at a venue of their choice working with their chosen client group.

ALL PARTICIPANTS MUST HAVE A CURRENT AND CLEAR CRIMINAL RECORDS BUREAU CHECK.

Applications on private woodland will need to have a Single Business Identifier (SBI) number. If the area of woodland is in a different ownership or off school grounds then the wood must be registered with the Rural Land Register (RLR) in the name of the legal owner. See our FC Operations No 19 for further information relating to both these matters. **School grounds are excluded from registering with the RLR and do not need to obtain an SBI number**

7. How regularly will be the Forest School sessions for each group e.g. daily, weekly etc? How many weeks in the school year will it run?

8. Please explain the Forest School's involvement with the local FEI cluster group? If possible, name the cluster that you are linked too.

9. Give details of any planned evaluation of learning and personal development of those involved in Forest School sessions. If Leader training is to be grant aided, please provide details of the training provider.

10. Give details of...

- Current or proposed qualifications in First Aid
- Risk assessments required
- Child protection policy
- Emergency procedures
- Appropriate Criminal Record Bureau checks
