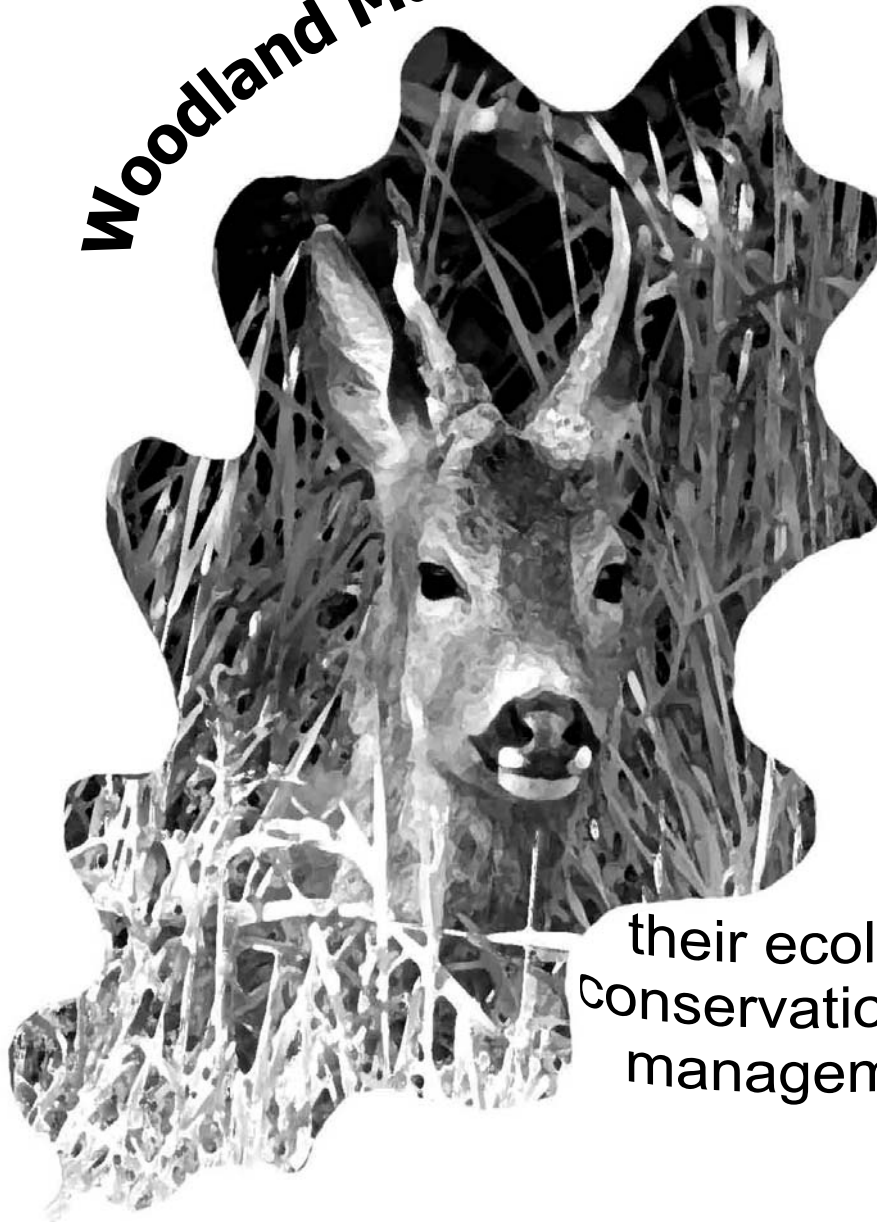

Getting there

By road - The University is well signed from all the main roads into Exeter. Follow the signs to either of the main campus entrances and then look out for the DMG event signs, which will lead you to the Peter Chalk Centre.

By public transport – The University is about a twenty minute walk from St. David's Station or Central Station. Follow the University pedestrian signs, which are clearly marked on the lamp posts from both railway stations and the centre of the city all the way to the campus. Once at the campus, follow the DMG event signs to the Peter Chalk Centre. Alternatively, take the H bus from the centre of the city direct to the Peter Chalk Centre.
