Addendum to EWGS 7 Guidance: Woodland Creation Grant

<p>Introduction</p>	<p>The EWGS7 Booklet (version 6, published May 2009) provides the main rules for this grant. This addendum highlights changes for 2010 and provides some points of clarification</p>
<p>Timings and Budget for 2010</p>	<p>Application window</p> <p>We are accepting applications for the 2010 regional Additional Contributions from the <u>1st May 2010</u>.</p> <p>The <u>application deadline is 30th September 2010</u>.</p> <p>Planting and Claim Years</p> <p>Applications can include planting between Autumn 2010 and Spring 2013, with claims years 2010/2011, 2011/2012, 2012/2013 and 2013/2014. We normally expect some work to take place in the coming planting season i.e. by Spring 2011.</p> <p>Budget availability</p> <p>Budget is managed to ensure both national and regional targets are met. We want to fully commit the creation budget for 10/11 and 11/12, approximately half of 12/13 and a small proportion of the 13/14 budget – this is in line with FC England’s Budget Management Policy (Operations Note 7)</p>

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<p>Farm Woodland Payment and Single Payment Compatibility</p>	<p>Under revised EU rules, if you are eligible for Single Payment Scheme on the land to be planted, you can continue to claim SPS as well as Farm Woodland Payments</p>																		

<p>EWGS Woodland Creation & Carbon Funding</p>	<p>Carbon finance can provide an additional funding stream for woodland creation. Where EWGS funded schemes also receive carbon finance, it is important that statements are not made regarding the carbon benefits that are incorrect and risk bringing disrepute to the Scheme, applicant or Forestry Commission.</p> <p>It is not possible at the present time for carbon offsets to be generated by forestry/tree planting projects taking place in the UK that satisfy the requirements of international carbon markets. To provide clarity over this issue and consistency with the Government’s position on carbon offsetting, the Forestry Commission will not administer grant-aid to projects that also receive funding by claiming that they generate tradable carbon offsets.</p> <p>FC wish to encourage private funding of woodland creation and grant-aid will continue to be administered to projects also receiving carbon funding as long as communication of the carbon benefits associated with woodland creation are consistent with the UK Government’s position, as outlined below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • It is acknowledged that the project will contribute to the UK meeting its future climate change commitments; • The terms carbon offset, offsetting, carbon trading or carbon credits are not used; • That those investing in the project are not under the impression that the carbon savings have already been made. <p>The submission of a WCG application will be taken as acceptance of these requirements as a condition of contract. The conditions apply to applications for grant-aid received after its publication and do not apply retrospectively.</p> <p>The detailed requirements that will apply in 2010, together with background and further information are set out in Operations Note 20 “Position on co-funding of woodland creation through EWGS and carbon finance”.</p>
<p>Regional Additional Contributions available for 2010</p>	<p>A summary of the regional additional contributions (AC) available for applications received after 1st May 2010 is available at Appendix 1. One or more AC may be applied, up to a maximum payment of £2000/ha. Full details are available in the regional guidance, which is on the website, or contact your local FC office for further information and advice</p>

At the discretion of the FC, we may allow the additional contribution to be applied to expanding sites of exceptionally high conservation value even if they are not categorised as ancient semi-natural woodland. - The proposed woodland must use site native broadleaves in accordance with Forestry Commission "Guidance for the management of ancient and native woodlands". - New semi-natural woodland should ideally be established by natural seeding and colonisation. If planting is necessary, the design of the new woodland should follow the good practice set out in the Forestry Commission publication "Creating new native woodlands" Bulletin 112 (Gordon S Patterson, 1994) or any subsequent relevant guidance. Where cultural heritage issues are important, it is likely that Bulletin 112 may be applied more flexibly.

West Midlands	Woodland Opportunity Map priority areas £2000	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - New woodland will be created within the priority areas shown on the West Midlands Woodland Opportunity Map – Priority Areas. 	Ancient Woodland Landscapes – restoration areas £2000	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - New Native Woodland will be created within the priority areas shown on the Ancient Woodland Landscapes restoration map (see guidance). - Applications will be for creating native woodlands that follow the good practice set out in the Forestry Commission publication "Creating new native woodlands" Bulletin 112 (Gordon S Patterson, 1994). - At least 80% of the tree and shrub species to be planted are locally native. - Proposal links, where appropriate, woodland creation to existing woodland sites or to other semi natural habitats. Generally proposals should be within 30m of existing ancient woodland sites, but up to 100m if the intervening land use is dominated by semi-natural habitat.

	<p>New woodland with public access in a Quality of Place priority area £2000</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Proposal is in a Quality of Place (QoP) priority area, or within the Forest of Mercia Community Forest (see Figure 3 below or view both on the Land Information Search). - Proposal is for New Native, Small Standard, Standard or Community Woodland specification that creates high quality, accessible woodland and meets Community Woodland design guidelines and local needs. - Proposal is accessible for free, quiet enjoyment by the public (including dogs on leads) during daylight hours for 11 months of each year, and remains so for 30 years from first payment of grant. - Proposals that include the Special Broadleaves specification are eligible for this grant payment, but: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Only where the woodland proposal area is made up of at least 50% woodland type meeting with New Native, Small Standard, Standard or Community Woodland specifications. - The Special Broadleaves part of the proposal is not eligible for the AC. - The Special Broadleaves part must be scored separately (EWGS 7a).

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Note: the Peak District part of South Yorkshire is eligible but administered by the East Midlands FC office. - The woodland must be designed to benefit the chosen species and comprise at least 80% native species. - In order to assess the effectiveness of this grant and to compare with similar initiatives, applicants must agree to periodic monitoring of the woodland.
	New woodland with public access in a Quality of Place priority area £2000	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - New woodland will be created within QoP areas. - The woodland must be designed to provide high quality access, be accessible for free, quiet enjoyment by the public (including dogs on leads) during daylight hours for 11 months of each year, and access must be permitted for 30 years from first payment of grant.
	Ancient Woodland Priority Areas £2000	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Be contiguous with an Ancient Woodland Site (as defined by Natural England Ancient Woodland Inventory (Provisional) for England). - Must be located in the CANDO (Cultural and Natural Development Opportunity) priority area (see figure 1) or South and West Yorkshire, west of the A1(M). - Match an appropriate native woodland type as described in Forestry Commission Bulletin 112.
