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INTRODUCTION

Both **Thieves** and **Blidworth Woods** are typical of the urban fringe woodlands of Sherwood Forest comprising of a patch-work of pine forest and lowland heath.

Thieves Wood is located less than two miles from the centre of Mansfield and backs onto the main Nottingham Road (A60). A car park is located at the south-western end of the wood which has a capacity for 100 vehicles. Two waymarked walks start here, one being a short surfaced walk and the other a “Link trail “ which leads to a small forest classroom at the northern fringe of the wood.

Recreationally the wood is busy all year round with the core of users being dog walkers with transitory cyclists and horse riders. Adjacent woods are quieter in terms of volume of visitors but do have a reputation for “anti-social” behaviour. The overall management aim of the wood is to provide informal recreation with the emphasis on local walkers.

Blidworth Woods Complex covers 400 Ha and has 5 car parks around the perimeter. The main block has both heavy use from equestrians and from dog walkers. Several trails have been removed in recent years and replaced with an easy access trail from the Longdale Lane Car Park and more recently a “link trail” which orbits the wood linking the three car parks.

The surrounding villages comprise of commuter belt and old pit villages, much of the farmland now being converted to equestrian paddocks. Again “anti-social behaviour” is common throughout the wood and has led us to remove facilities such as toilets some years ago.

The overall management aims of the wood are to provide a combination of formal and informal equestrian facilities integrated with informal facilities for walkers.

Both woods have seen a great deal of change in recent years both in terms of the landscape of the wood and the gradual improvement of the recreational facilities that were installed in the late 1970’s.

Future plans for the woods will be determined with consultation with users via the voluntary wardens group and via formal surveys.

SUMMARY

This report provides results from a survey that took place at Sherwood Forest District. A total of 227 questionnaires were completed, 126 in Blidworth Woods and 101 in Thieves Woods.

53% of the groups consisted of 2 people, with a further 24% of groups consisting of 1 person. 67% of groups included adults aged between 25-59 years, 32% included senior citizens, 7% included young adults aged 16-24 years, and 15% of groups included children.

87% of respondents were locals (living within 15 miles of the site), 8% of visitors were on a day trip from home and a further 5% were holidaymakers. The most popular type of accommodation for holidaymakers was in bed and breakfast or guesthouse.

94% of respondents had visited the sites before. Of those who had visited the woodland before, 40% visited between 1 and 3 times a week. 31% visited most days.

69% had always known about the woodland. 14% found out through friends and relatives. A further 8% had found out through road signs.

71% of respondents at the woodland were visiting to walk (including dog walking).

37% of respondents were staying at the woodland for around an hour.

70% used the waymarked walks. Of those who expressed an opinion about the waymarked walks, 58% rated the route marking as good or very good. And 62% rated the quality of the path as good or very good.

Those who used them generally rated the picnic area and the car park satisfactory.

SHERWOOD VISITOR SURVEY 2000

The Sherwood Visitor Survey 2000 ran between July and August 2000. A total of 227 interviews were completed: 126 in Blidworth Woods and 101 in Thieves Woods.

Group Composition

There were a total of 471 visitors in the 227 groups interviewed. There were roughly equal numbers of male and female visitors.

53% of groups included 2 people, and 24% consisted of 1 person. 8% of groups consisted of 3 people.

Excluding groups of 10 or more, there were on average 2.1 people per group.

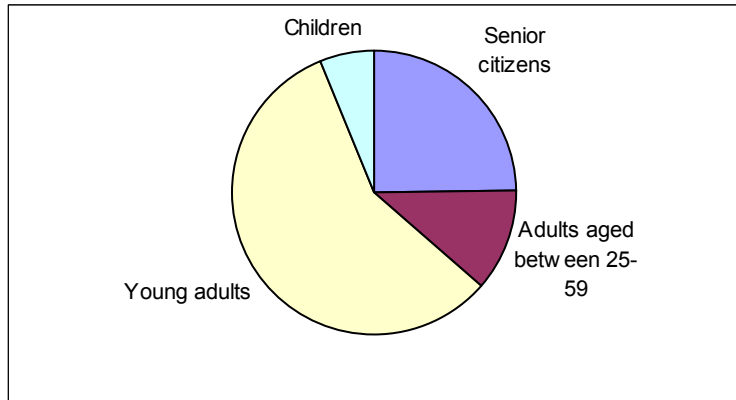
Figure 1.1: Group Size



The majority of groups (67%) included adults aged between 25-59 years, and 32% included at least one senior citizen. 7% of groups included young adults and 15% included children.

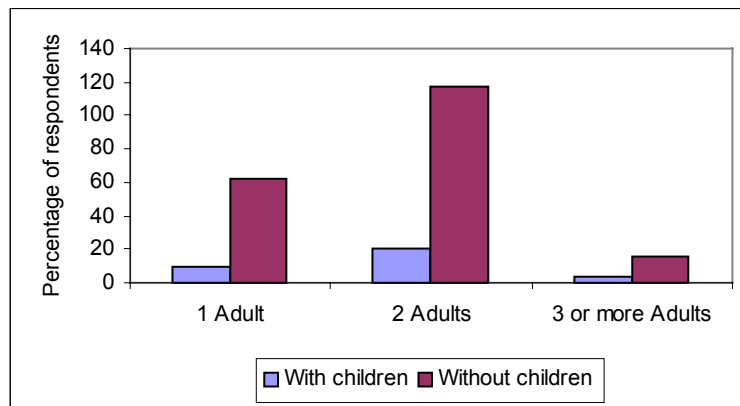
In terms of total visitors, adults aged between 25-59 years accounted for 58% of all visitors. 12% of all visitors were children, and 24% were senior citizens.

51% of groups consisted of two adults and no children, and 27% consisted of 1 adult and no children.

Figure 1.3: Type of Group

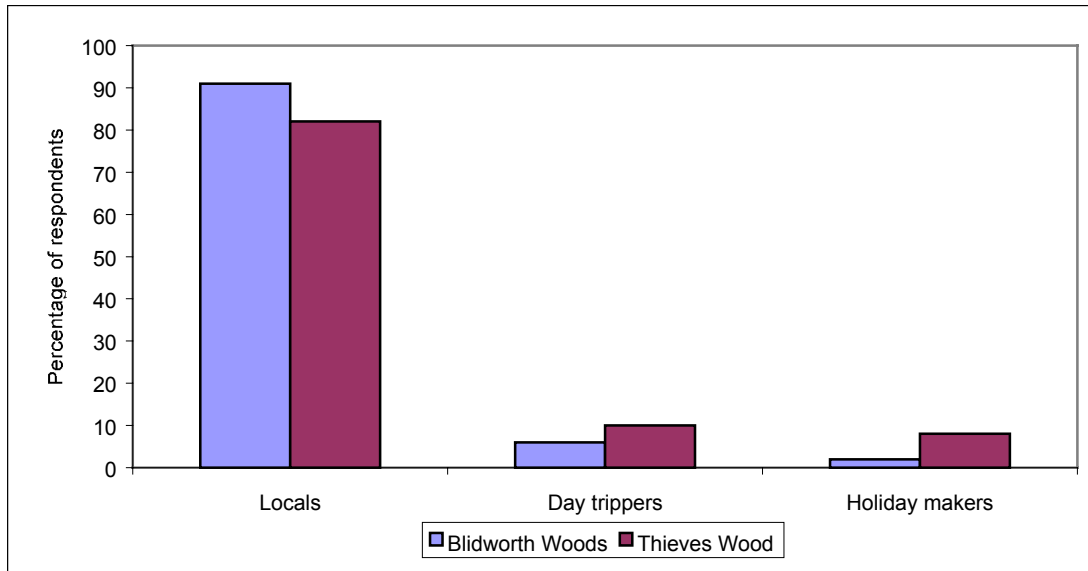


53% of groups had dogs with them. 4% of groups were with bikes.

Type of Visitor

87% of visitors were locals (living within 15 miles of the site). 5% of visitors were holidaymakers. 8% were on a day trip from home.

Visitor Profile

All of those interviewed were asked to provide their full home postcode.

Each of these postcodes was assigned an “ACORN” code. The Acorn classification was created using cluster analysis of the 1991 Population Census to divide almost all postcodes in 54 “types”. These types can be aggregated into 17 “groups” and the groups into 6 broad “categories” (A to F). Addresses in postcodes within any “type” will therefore tend to have a lot in common and can be given a label which describes the typical member of that “type”, e.g. “Wealthy suburbs, large detached houses”.

The acorn codes are reassigned each year to represent demographic changes since 1991.

The table below shows the proportion of valid postcodes from the survey that fall into each group. This is then compared to the overall GB population using an index, to look for similarities and differences between the two.

The table shows that the level of visits to Sherwood is highest amongst the ‘Wealthy Achievers, Suburbia’ (A1) and “Comfortable Middle Agers, Mature Home Owning Areas” (D9).

Visitor Origin

All those interviewed were asked to provide their full postcode. Table 1.3 shows the origin of visitors, based on the home postcodes and town/country names supplied.

Majority of respondents did not give their postcodes.

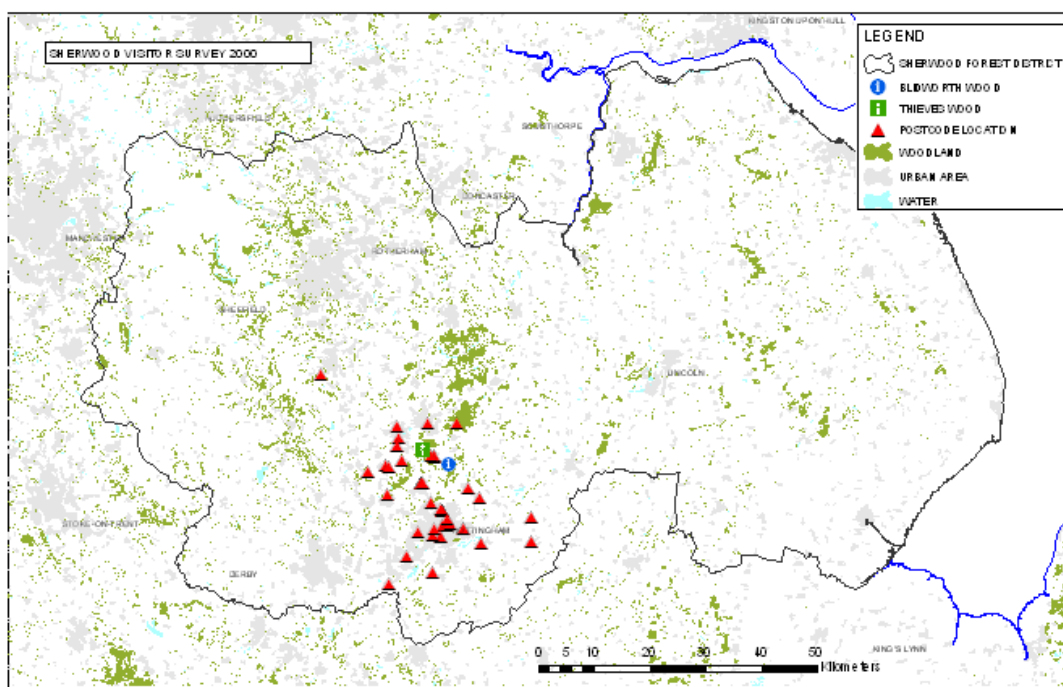


Figure 1: Map indicating the origin of visitors from the local area giving a valid postcode to the Sherwood sites.

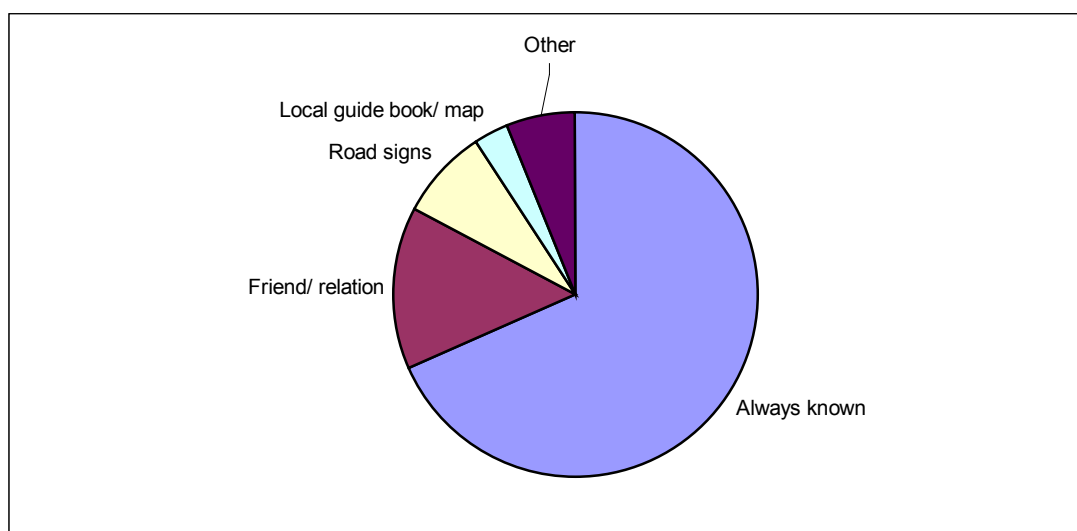
Type of Accommodation

95% of respondents travelled from home. Most people who did not travel from home stayed in a Bed and Breakfast or Guest House.

Finding out about the site

69% of all respondents had always known about the woodland. 14% found out through friends or relatives. A further 8% of respondents found out through road signs.

The table below shows that the majority of repeat visitors had always known about the site. 62% of first time visitors had always known about the site or found out through road signs.

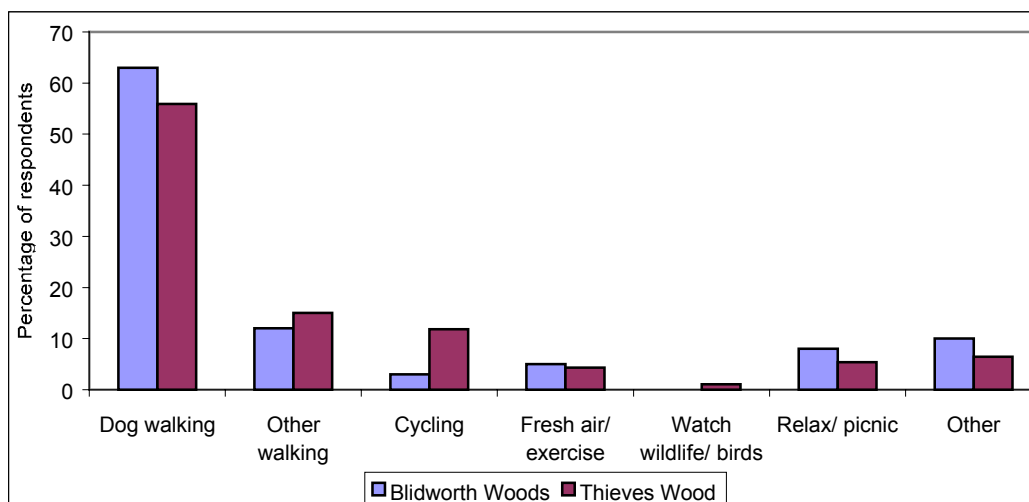

71% of respondents at the woodland were visiting to walk (including dog walking).

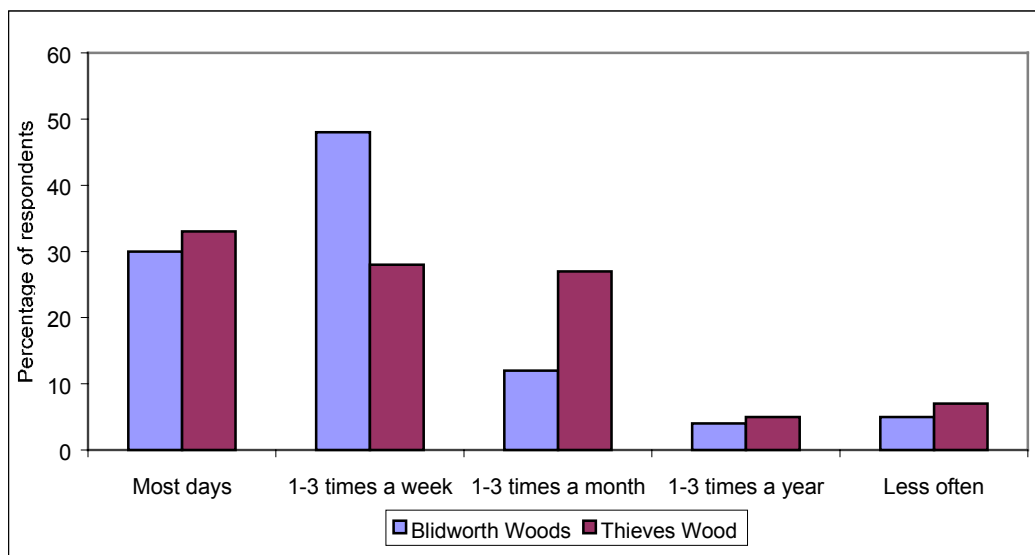
Figure 3: Main purpose of Visit



Frequency of visit

94% of respondents had visited the site before. Of those who visited the site before, 40% had visited between 1 and 3 times a week and 31% visited most days.

Figure 4: Frequency of visit

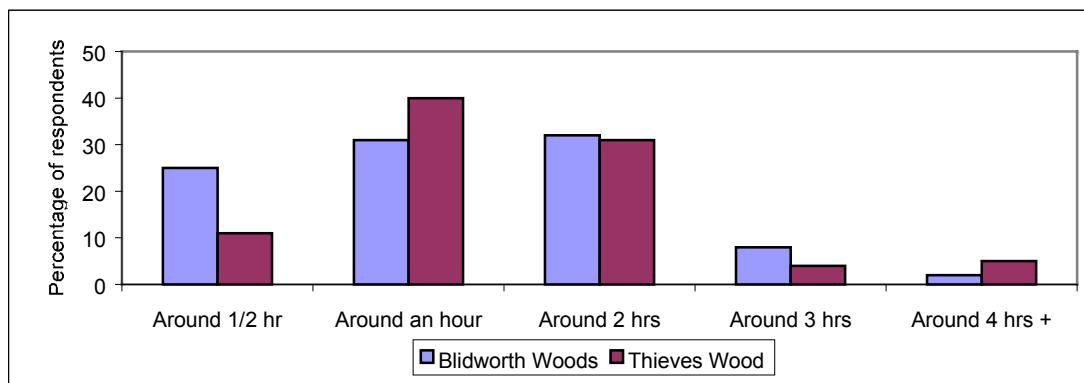


Length of Stay

37% of respondents were staying at the woodland for around an hour. 33% were staying for around 2 hours and 20% were staying around 3 hours.

The average length of stay at the woodland was 1.8 hours.

Figure 5: Length of Stay



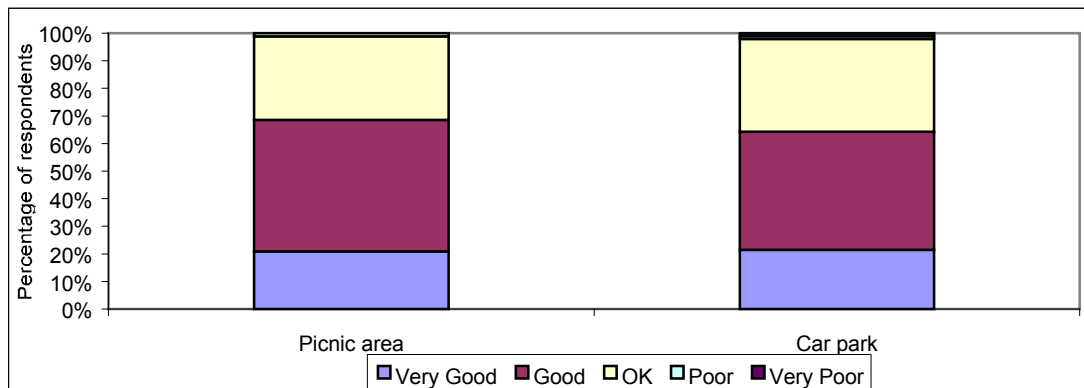
Waymarked walks

70% of respondents had used the waymarked walks. The blue walk was the most popular walk.

The results below present the ratings in terms of the proportion of visitors who expressed an opinion.

55% of respondents who used the waymarked routes expressed an opinion about the route marking. Of those, 58% of respondents rated it as good or very good. 95% of respondents who used the waymarked walks expressed an opinion about the quality of path. Of those, 62% of respondents rated it as good or very good.

53% of respondents who used the waymarked walk said they enjoyed the peace & quiet most about the forest.

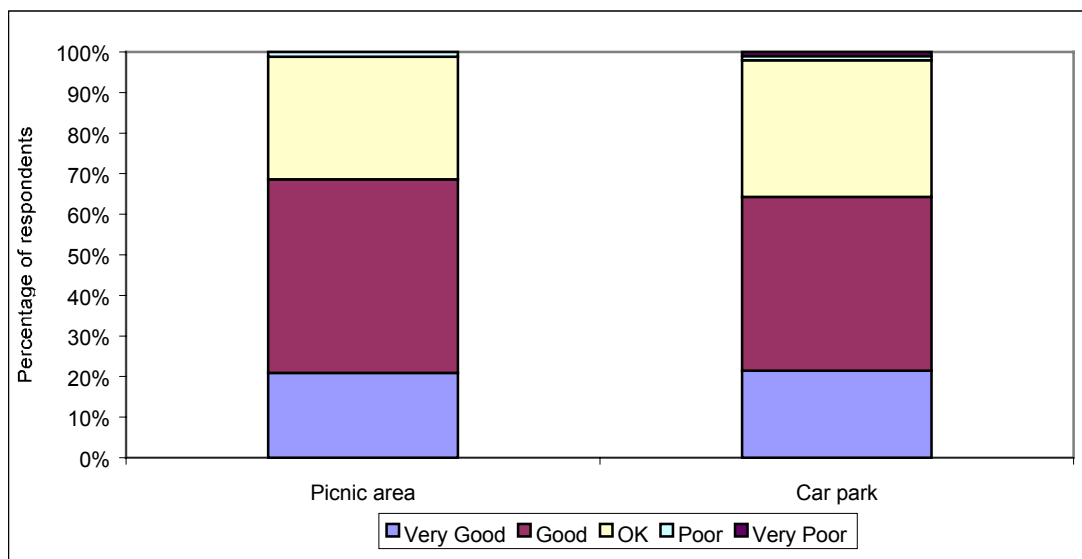
Ratings of facilities

The results below present the ratings for each facility in terms of the proportion of visitors who expressed an opinion (i.e. the proportion who had used each facility and provided a rating for it).

69% of respondents rated the picnic area as good or very good.

62% of respondents rated the car park as good or very good.

Information leaflets/boards

42% of respondents would like to see more information leaflets/boards.

Management of the woodland

77% of respondents thought that the Forestry Commission managed the woodland.

Improvements

Most of those interviewed (75%) suggested improvements to the site. Of those many requested improvements to the toilets, the horse bridle way and dog mess.

Special needs

4% respondents had a disability or special need. Of these, 43% had hearing needs and 43% had mobility needs.
