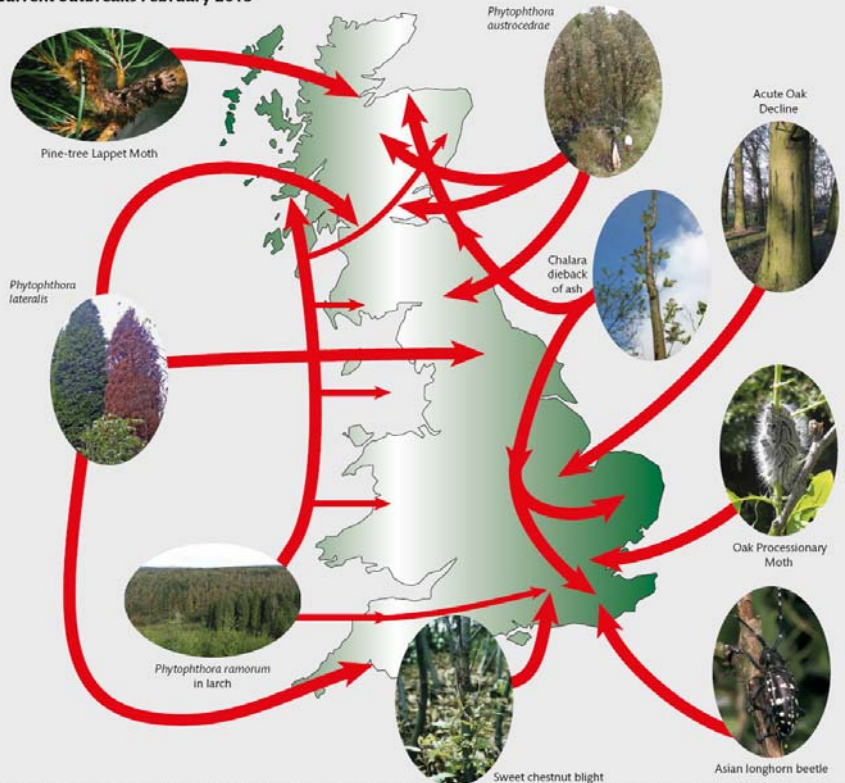

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This seminar will provide the opportunity for you to hear the latest information on the new (and sometimes old) pests and diseases threatening our trees and forests. Speakers will explain the current situation in Scotland, ongoing monitoring work, biosecurity requirements, and there will be a site visit to view pest and disease issues in the field.

**Clothing for site visit:** Attendees should bring suitable outdoor clothing for the site visit in the afternoon.
