Action for Ulnes Walton	The project is to plant trees on a verge alongside a main road where it enters the small village of Ulnes Walton and to subsequently create a woodland habitat with native flowers. 5 Black Poplars will be planted, since they are England's most endangered tree species and the site is particularly suitable (it is bordered by a wet ditch). Two active village groups will be supporting the project and the local primary school children will be involved at the planting stage.	125	125
Active Heritage	This project will develop a site in the grounds of the OSCA foundation, an organisation that provides outdoor sporting facilities. Natural foliage will be used to provide cover/shelter for physical activity, an appealing environment will be created to 'get healthy' outdoors and local young people will be engaged in planting projects. Through the project 50 volunteers will attain training and certification in respect of tree planting. Children will also be encouraged to adopt and take a tree home.	1925	0

Cannington in Bloom	<p>150 trees will be planted in areas in and around Cannington in Somerset. Sites will be selected on the basis of green spaces that are looking empty and unloved and would be enhanced by the planting of trees. This project is particularly focused on planting native species to benefit to wildlife and to encourage insects and birds to these areas. Planting will be carried out by members of Cannington in Bloom, local schools and community groups.</p>	150	0
Carr Lane Allotment Associations Committee	<p>The project is to develop an allotment site in North East Lincolnshire (Grimsby) and to improve access to the area for local schools and people with disabilities. The site will be enhanced through planting of fruit trees as well as putting in place seating and boundary works. The group will be setting up an 'on-site' community room for visitors to act as a shelter and an eco-toilet will also be installed. The use of the building as an education resource will encourage more effective use of the site for growing and picking of fruit.</p>	40	0

	<p>Fressingfield in Suffolk. Sites will include accessible open spaces around community buildings, school premises, along wide verges and in privately owned land adjacent to footpaths and roads. The project will increase fruit tree access, improve the area aesthetically and enhance the environment. The local school will be involved in all aspects of the project. Landowners with adjacent footpaths are being invited to develop 'spinney' areas to improve environmental aspects of the village. The establishment of a 'dispersed orchard' throughout the whole village and in domestic gardens will increase the quality of the 'treescape,' encourage sharing of fruit and galvanise community members who will organise celebratory events.</p>		
<p>Friends of Priors Hill Copse</p>	<p>This regeneration planting scheme is part of a 10 year management plan created in 2011 which was adopted by the Friends Group and Hound Parish Council. The project is to replace trees and to increase existing plant stock. The copse is an ancient oak coppiced woodland that stopped being managed about 70 years ago and has since become over run with holly and oaks which shaded the rest of the copse. Friends of Queensway Tranquil Park	This project is to create a new park on the centre of a field in Hazlemere in Buckinghamshire which is surrounded on three sides by housing. The park is to be used as recreational space to encourage active and social lifestyles, especially for the elderly, and for environmental and biodiversity benefits. The park (to be known as the Tranquil Park) will be set out with new trees, shrubs and meadow grasses with paths, picnic benches and tables with the aim of providing quiet relaxation and recreational activities for the local community. Pathways will be designed for wheelchair and pushchair access and for the use of cyclists.	170	0
Friends of Sudley Estate	The project is to help preserve an important visual amenity on an estate in the heart of the city of Liverpool. The group will plant 121 trees in four areas of Sudley Estate to reinstate lost trees and to create a small woodland area to improve the educational and conservation value for future generations. The project will also screen some allotment sites which are situated at the bottom of the estate. By involving the local schools in the planting phase, they will benefit from use of the site for tree and flower identification.	79	0

	<p>a large extent of open green space within an otherwise built-up district. A low number of trees has meant that the area has limited wildlife habitats for the protection of biodiversity. The group will increase the area of woodland and coppices protect avenues of trees and hedgerows, which will enrich the environment and help to reduce damage caused by wind on large open spaces.</p>		
Fulwood Row Nature Group	<p>This project is for the continuation and development of a newly established orchard in Lancashire. The group are working to create a sustainable and lasting legacy orchard for the benefit of the wider community. The Apple trees that have already been planted have attracted significant interest from local residents. The group will plant a further 180 Apple trees and develop the orchard in order to engage various members of the community in planting and harvesting activities. Following this, the project will also include a wildflower meadow and a pond, bird and insect boxes, as well as bat and owl boxes.</p>	180	0
Greening Wingrove	<p>This project will improve the public area for local communities by increasing the number of trees, particularly in or near high density residential areas. The group will plant a number of mature street trees which will create pocket gardens, change existing planting pits to</p>	1460	0

	incorporate small trees and plant large trees to improve the diversity of tree stock. Mature trees have been selected rather than whips as a way to reduce the potential for vandalism on the various sites. This project complements other planting initiatives in the area including a heritage funded project which includes planting in primary schools.		
Groundwork Bury and Bolton	This Groundwork project involves planting 240 trees in local open spaces across several deprived areas of Bury and Bolton. Planting will be carried out by approximately 160 members of the community giving them the opportunity to improve their physical environment and feel a sense of ownership of their local areas. Each planting date will be part of planned community based events taking place in each area and as well as the planting, residents will receive information on tree care and will be encouraged to further engage with the newly planted trees.	400	0
Groundwork Essex, Suffolk and Norfolk	This is a large-scale project to plant 17,550 trees in some of the most deprived urban areas in England. The aim of the project is to increase tree canopy, creating important wildlife habitat but also building the communities' capacity for future engagement in projects, and forging new partnerships. A key part of the project will be to organise WoodWORKS workshops to demonstrate how wood from sustainably	17550	0

	<p>managed forests can be used in contemporary woodworking projects by individuals and companies. These workshops will be tailored to different groups - open access, schools and NEET groups. Larger events (such as 'Community Fun Fays') will also be held to demonstrate progress on increasing tree cover and linking to the wider benefits that trees can offer.</p>		
Groundwork North East - Cumbria	<p>This project is to develop an area of common land in the village of Brisco on the outskirts of Carlisle, which is currently underused due to problems with poor drainage. The project will enhance the common for public use and to improve biodiversity. It will include resolving the drainage issues in a way that concentrates the wetland habitats into a series of small ponds/scrapes at the lowest point on the site. The trees will be designed and positioned to preserve the most interesting areas of wet meadow on the site. Primary schools and local volunteers will be involved in the planting.</p>	960	0
High Bickington Community Property Trust	<p>The tree planting is part of an overall landscape plan to enhance an area which surrounds 16 newly built affordable homes, workshops and community facilities. The site was designed for occupation by young people and families who would not otherwise be able to afford to rent or buy their own homes. High Bickington is in</p>	200	0

	<p>Torrige district, which has the lowest average wage in the country. This project is to create an attractive environment for those living and working there through tree planting and landscaping work. The group will involve a significant proportion of the owners and tenants of the homes, young people and the local community.</p>		
Northfield Ecocentre	<p>Northfield Ecocentre are to continue their work in Birmingham by setting up and running a community nursery at their existing community garden and working with community groups, businesses and schools to design and plant groups of trees in community spaces. They will run workshops to build community capacity for protecting trees and green spaces and hold events to celebrate and educate the local community about the need to protect trees and the environment. A harvest project will be set to pick fruit that would otherwise go to waste. Planting fruit trees and broadleaf whips will provide habitat for wildlife, increase biodiversity, and reduce air pollution and carbon emissions while providing a teaching resource about healthy eating and nutrition. The harvest project is designed to reduce food wastage and the overall project will reduce 'food miles.'</p>	3000	0

	<p>will be expanding a community garden to create a woodland area by regenerating a derelict playing field site. The group will be creating two mini woodlands projects, a willow bank and a traditional fruit orchard. The fruit and vegetables grown from the orchard will be distributed to local food bank schemes and the willow will be used to undertake traditional crafts, create willow structures, and to support courses in crafts.</p>		
Richmondshire Leisure Trust	<p>This project is aimed at engaging the local community in improving the site of a leisure centre in North Yorkshire by making it greener and more environmentally friendly. The overall objective is to benefit the community by increasing their sense of well-being through direct engagement in the project and as a result of the planting; the project will also improve ecology in the area. The planting will form part of the centre's 10th birthday celebration and the trees will be planted in partnership with 4Youth team, a local children's centre and Colburn Town Council.</p>	125	0
Shenley Park Trust	<p>This project is to enable the continued enhancement of Shenley Park, a 45 acre rural park in Hertfordshire. The group will boost tree numbers in Shenley Park, both to replenish stock that has been removed due to disease/age and to plant areas of woodland to</p>	450	0

	<p>secure the rural habitat for the future. The Trust will be engaging the local primary school and Scout and Guide groups to carry out the planting of the 450 trees in copse areas around the park.</p>		
Skillnet Group CIC	<p>A local social enterprise group will be planting trees in three separate areas. The first area is a former fly-tipping site which has been transformed into community allotments. Here the group will be working with a local housing association and two children's centres to create an educational garden where volunteers will be given the opportunity to develop skills in permaculture, organic gardening and sustainable living. The second is the site of an eco café, where they will be planting trees to screen a busy main road. The third is a greening project, linking green spaces in the Milton area. This includes a country park and residential areas which will involve local housing association residents in the planting.</p>	701	0
St Edwards Tenants & Residents Association	<p>The project will improve St Edwards's park by involving the local community in planting native trees. The planting site is on what is now bare ground due to previous storm damage to a substantial section of a conifer stand on the edge of the woods. The planting will benefit the wildlife of the area as the Churnet Valley is a key area for woodland bird species, which have</p>	650	

	seen dramatic declines nationally. The planting will also improve the amenity value of the woodland, encouraging people to spend time in the woods, walking, running or cycling.		
St Erme Community Enhancement Group	St Erme is a largely rural parish in mid Cornwall with a relatively high level of deprivation. Phase 1 of the scheme will be to plant 56 small leaf lime trees and 90 beech trees on Trispen Hill which is the main village entrance road. Phase 2, along the right hand of Trispen Hill, will be to cut back overgrown hedges and to plant 18 cherry trees leading to the centre of the village. 3 'flagship' copper beech and magnolia trees will be planted at the entrance of the village and 15 oak trees will be planted on the verge of the old A39 beside an existing oak tree. Phase 3, along the perimeter of the village will see 18 fruit trees planted which will include a variety of apple, plums and pears. Adults and children within the village will be involved in the planting, pruning and harvest. Any surplus fruit will be turned into chutneys and jam to circulate to the elderly in the parish.	249	0

Stroud Valleys	Stroud Valleys are working in partnership with a number of community groups and local councils to plant native trees in a number of community green spaces in the Stroud district, Gloucestershire. Local volunteers will plant 503 street trees at Capel Mill to help regenerate the land between a busy A road and the canal side. 1500 trees will be planted each year in Stroud's main leisure park, Stratford Park and in the old cemetery as well as a number of smaller locations including some community orchard sites across the district.	4172	553
Tinsley Tree Project	This project is a series of woodland planting schemes across 3 - 6 sites in the city. These sites will be situated within neighbourhoods that fall under the national average in terms of deprivation and urban greening. The plans are supporting Sheffield City Council's project to redesignate 100 hectares of existing parkland from turf to trees. The group will be engaging a diverse range of partners including: friends of groups, local TRA's, Action groups, Sheffield inter-faith group and Scouts, Guides and other youth groups and well as statutory agencies.	3575	0
Warwick Tree Wardens	This application is to plant across 3 locations in	2457	0

	<p>Warwickshire. The intention at the first location is to 'green' the entrance to Warwickshire's historic county town - to reinstate many of the lost trees and to plant for the future. The second location is at Bishops Tachbrook Primary School who are keen to introduce a shelter belt for the school. This is intended to reduce the impact of wind damage, to absorb some of the carbon emission from traffic and to provide shelter. The third location is at: Europa Way, Leamington Spa; a much used main road (A452). A whole swathe of young whips and 3 standards will replace the brash and brambles which have taken over.</p>		
<p>Wimbleball Conservation Volunteers</p>	<p>The group are creating a community orchard in Somerset that can be used for future community events including wassailing and apple picking / bobbing involving local people, visitors, school groups and volunteers. The project will involve members of the local community each planting 1 apple tree, fencing off the area using post and rail timber fencing, placing 2 picnic benches and planting 100 native species. The project will create educational opportunities for school groups and volunteers, including fruit tree pruning, grafting and processing. Worcestershire Community Land Cooperative	<p>This project is part of a wider initiative to create a new green corridor from the city centre to riverside amenities. Some of this land is currently derelict waste ground and adjacent to a network of busy roads. The partnership is therefore keen to focus on opening this up and creating a new green space by planting trees for general public use. The second site, which is outside of the city centre, is to be developed into orchards, edible landscapes, wetlands and allotments. Both sites will be accessible to the general public and for use as community assets and amenities.</p>	232	20
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
